We are delighted to submit this Statement of Qualifications regarding the CRA/LA RFQ to "Provide Urban Forestry Consultant Services" to the many deserving CRA/LA project areas.

KYCC's Environmental Services Unit, has made urban forestry our first priority since Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa introduced his Million Trees LA Initiative. In 2007 alone, KYCC planted over 1,640 street trees (15-gallon) in Central and South Los Angeles. Tree planting is nothing new to KYCC, our history of urban forestry projects, in fact, dates back to repairing the Wilshire Center Koreatown canopy after the 1992 Los Angeles riots.

Over the last 18 months, KYCC has been working very closely with CRA/LA management, including Caroline Sim and Michele Banks-Ordone, on greening the Wilshire Center / Koreatown CRA/LA project area. KYCC has already surveyed and identified over 1,500 potential tree planting locations in that project area, and we have planted over 300 trees in Wilshire Center / Koreatown in 2008 – with approximately 500 more to be installed over the next year.

Additionally, we are also working with Margaret Wardell in the Pico Union 1 & 2 project areas, and will soon be surveying and canvassing the Westlake project area. KYCC has also been greening the Mid-City Corridors project area and has planted over 200 trees in these project areas since January 2007, with several hundred more planned for 08-09.

Irma Garcia, KYCC's Certified Arborist, ensures that all KYCC street tree planting is performed in accordance with the Bureau of Street Services, Urban Forestry Division (UFD) specifications. Coordination with UFD staff on our various urban forestry projects happens on a daily basis.

KYCC applauds the CRA/LA initiative to provide professional urban forestry services throughout its project areas. At the minimum, the maintenance of all trees planted within CRA/LA project boundaries, through the critical establishment period, is in the best interest of the entire City of Los Angeles – a true public benefit. We look forward to the possibility of expanding our role and scope of services we can provide to the CRA/LA and the constituents will all serve.

**KYCC's Statement of Qualifications
In Response to the CRA/LA
RFQ to Provide Urban Forestry Consultant Services**

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B. Company Profile/General Information

The **Korean Youth Center** (KYC) started in 1975 as a project of the Asian American Drug Abuse Program (AADAP) to serve Korean youth. At that time, AADAP was seeing a rise in Korean youth involved in drug abuse and gangs. As the Korean community in Los Angeles grew, KYC grew, becoming a 501c3 in 1982, although KYC always served non-Koreans as well. After the Los Angeles Civil Unrest in 1992, KYC expanded the program focus to include the surrounding community, changing the organization's name to "**Korean Youth and Community Center**" (KYCC).

The name changed again in 2004 to the "**Koreatown Youth and Community Center**" to better reflect the organization's mission to serve the entire Koreatown community. The organization made a conscious effort to diversify on all levels – the board, staff, languages used and constituents served. Today, KYCC's staff is overwhelmingly bilingual in Spanish, Korean or other languages. Over 46 percent of KYCC's staff is Latino while 39 percent is Korean or Korean American. Almost 60 percent of the clients served are Latino, reflecting the demographic make up of the community. Slightly over 31 percent of clients served are Asian (including Korean) while seven percent are African-American; about 1.5 percent Caucasian and the rest 'Other' or more than one ethnicity.

KYCC has changed and grown along with Koreatown, now operating four sites and two affordable housing projects in Koreatown (soon to be four affordable housing projects with over 200 units). In 2006, KYCC served more than 25,000 children, youth and families through a continuum of services.

The mission of the Koreatown Youth and Community Center (KYCC) is to serve the evolving needs of the Korean American population in the greater Los Angeles area as well as the multi-ethnic Koreatown community. KYCC's programs and services are directed toward recently immigrated, economically disadvantaged youth and families, and promote community socioeconomic empowerment.

Brief summary of KYCC's Programs and Services:

- Early childhood education and development, including family literacy and child-directed learning in a safe, nurturing and multicultural environment;
- Academic programs to help children (K-12) succeed in school, such as tutoring, homework assistance and enrichment activities;
- Leadership development and life skills programs for youth including focuses on HIV/AIDS/STI prevention, substance abuse prevention, gang intervention, mentoring and arts and cultural enrichment;
- Mental health services, including individual and family therapy for at-risk youth and their parents (out-patient, school-based and in-home), medication management, child abuse prevention/intervention and parent education;
- Environmental services such as graffiti removal, tree planting, tree maintenance, tree distribution, energy conservation, and other services to beautify neighborhoods and improve quality of life; and

- Community economic development services, including small business technical assistance, affordable housing, individual development accounts, and financial literacy services.

KYCC's staff of 50+ works on many contracts concurrently. KYCC's Environmental Services Unit (from which the services relating to this SOQ will be performed), carried out approximately 1 million dollars of urban environmental work across a variety of contracts.

C. Qualifications/Experience

1. Describe your firm's overall experience in providing urban forestry services.

Over the last 15 years, KYCC has had a rich and successful experience in providing urban forestry services.

Currently, KYCC is one of the four contractors planting trees across central and south Los Angeles as part of the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power's Trees For A Green Los Angeles (TFGLA) public space tree planting program. The TFGLA program is the most comprehensive tree planting program Los Angeles has experienced in, at least, three decades.

KYCC is an extremely productive member of this collaboration. Over the last 18 months, KYCC has planted over 3,000 trees, over 95% of which have been street trees. Perhaps even more significant, over 80% of the trees that KYCC has planted over that time have been in communities of low-canopy cover, in disadvantaged, tree poor communities of Council Districts 10, 8, 9, 1, 4, and 13.

In the pre-planting stages for these last 3,000 trees, KYCC has selected a model of urban greening which is, perhaps, the most proactive method of responsible urban forestry performed by any non-profit agency in recent history. KYCC is surveying, "marking", and canvassing every street within CD10 and the northern half of CD8 (north of Slauson) and creating "vacancy" reports – indicating and inventorying each potential new tree opportunity.

These opportunities are indicated by "marks" which KYCC staff makes based on City of Los Angeles, Urban Forestry Division (UFD) tree spacing specifications. Daily contact with UFD inspector, Luis Torres, helps ensure KYCC is up-to-date with UFD policies, procedures, and

specifications. Irma Garcia, KYCC's Tree Planting Program Coordinator is a Certified Arborist, and manages and oversees all tree planting projects on a daily basis

From these vacancy reports KYCC performs all pre-planting requirements, such as providing appropriate species suggestions to UFD, acquiring permits from UFD, obtaining property owner/representative permissions, working with the Los Angeles Conservation Corps (prime contractor of TFGLA) to have the appropriate trees procured, working with UFD to have them "tagged", and then caring for the trees properly at KYCC Environmental Services site until planting.

KYCC's tree planting experience actually began after the Los Angeles riots in the 1990's. KYCC was part of collaboration that planted over 2,000 trees throughout the burnt and damaged neighborhoods of Koreatown. Many of the trees that now are the backbone of shade along the Wilshire corridor were planted by KYCC.

In between the recent 3,000 TFGLA planted trees and the re-forestation of Koreatown of the 1990's, KYCC has performed many significant urban forestry projects including:

- **Planting Healthy School Routes Project** (500 street trees planted)
- **Cool Communities Streetscape Project** (900 street trees planted)
- **Tree-Lined Routes to the River Project** (550 street trees planted)
- **Greenways to Schools Project** (300 street trees planted)
- **Various Env. Affairs Department contracts** (over 400 street trees planted)

Lastly, KYCC is one of six contractors actively working on Mayor Antonio Villiariagosa's Million Trees LA program. KYCC has assisted by responsibly distributing over 5,000 shade trees to Los Angeles residents for planting on private property.

KYCC's overall experience in providing comprehensive urban forestry services is well proven by the projects listed above, and the resulting success of those projects. KYCC is adept at all pre-planting activities (surveying, marking, and canvassing), provides professional planting services, and performs many critical post-planting responsibilities (follow-up letters to owners, watering, re-staking, re-tying, and overall tree maintenance/care).

2. Include a brief description of other engagements which could conflict with CRA/LA assignments

KYCC does not currently have engagements, nor foresees any activities, which could conflict with CRA/LA assignments.

3. Describe why your firm is particularly qualified to provide the services requested

KYCC is particularly qualified to perform the services requested due to our overall experience, our high rate of tree planting success (including survivorship), and our knowledge and ability to perform nearly every aspect of the scope of services listed in the RFQ – please see “**Attachment 1**”.

Additionally, KYCC is particularly qualified to perform the work listed in the RFQ because KYCC has surveyed, marked, and canvassed every street in the CRA/LA Wilshire Center Koreatown project area, most of the Pico Union 1 and 2 project areas, a large portion of the Mid-City Corridor project area, and all of the Normandie 5 project area. Over the last 18 months, KYCC has planted over 450 trees in those areas alone, and has plans to plant an additional 500 in the Wilshire Center Koreatown project area (working closely with Caroline Sim and Yonah Hong).

Furthermore, KYCC will be planting approximately 200-300 trees in Pico Union 1 and 2 over the next year (working closely with Margaret Wardell). Concurrently, KYCC will be planting approximately 200 trees in the Normandie 5 project area as well.

Since KYCC has already performed extensive pre-planting activities in these CRA/LA project areas, and has already planted a significant amount of trees within the above mentioned project boundaries, KYCC believes we are a natural choice for providing additional services to the CRA/LA in these project areas, and are interested in other central and south project areas as well.

Over summer, 2008, KYCC will be working extensively in the CRA/LA project areas of Westlake, Mid-City Corridors (Jefferson and southern part of Crenshaw), Exposition / University Park, and the Crenshaw project area – further making KYCC a natural fit.

4. KYCC has extensive experience on virtually every qualification/requirement stated in the RFQ, and performs most of the urban forestry tasks sought by the CRA/LA on a daily basis.

KYCC has planted over 3,000 trees over the last 18 months. The majority of these trees were planted under LADWP’s Trees For A Green Los Angeles, Public Space Tree Planting. Below is a summary/report of work performed on the TFGLA public space tree plantings as well as information on other large urban forestry projects KYCC has recently performed. The below list is not a complete list of projects, just ones of large scope that directly illustrate relevant experience in skills being sought by the CRA/LA RFQ.



With the support of Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa, his Million Trees LA program, and LADWP, KYCC and 3 other tree planting groups enlarged their scope of tree planting. Each group outlined their priority constituencies and project areas. KYCC's is the sole tree planting organization for Council District 10, Council District 8 (north of Slauson), and a small portion of Council District 9 (west of the 110).

In addition, other areas that KYCC is the exclusive tree planting partner include the Wilshire Center / Koreatown CRA/LA project area (including portions of CD1, 4, and 13), the Pico Union 1 and 2 project area, and the Westlake Project area.

KYCC has surveyed, marked, and canvassed nearly every street in Council District 10, leading to approximately 1,900 street trees being planted in CD10 since 1/1/07. The other 1,100 trees planted by KYCC over this time were spread amongst the other Council Districts (and a couple smaller projects outside the Council Districts listed above). Below is a basic map that shows the locations of the 3,000 trees KYCC has planted since 1/1/07 – each new tree location is indicated by a tree.



In terms of relevant experience to the applicable qualification requirements set forth by the CRA/LA RFQ, qualifications “A-G” are performed 6 days a week for the above mentioned project areas (although qualification F is only performed when a repair needs to be made).

In terms of qualification “B”, KYCC is, and has been contracted to provide these services by various entities, including Neighborhood Councils, Neighborhood Associations, and the CRA/LA.

In terms of qualification “E”, in addition to performing door-to-door outreach and leaving door-hangers on non-responding properties, KYCC also performs direct mail to each and every property that is eligible for a tree (based on UFD spacing requirements). KYCC method of outreach is to provide an equal opportunity to every property within our project areas. Most properties receive direct mail solicitations to participate a minimum of 3 times. Furthermore, KYCC performs post-planting direct mail to educate the owner/residents on the species of tree planted and provides watering instruction. Each of these mailings are typically customized for each community. Generic samples of these documents are included in **“Attachment 6”**.

KYCC works daily on increasing the number of trees that can be installed via concrete cuts. In 2008, KYCC has identified and attained permission to have over 175 concrete cuts performed. KYCC regularly coordinates with the Los Angeles Conservation Corps for qualifications “H” and “I” to obtain the A-Permits and ensure the work is done correctly. After LACC has cut and removed the concrete, KYCC returns to the site, plants the appropriate tree, and backfills the new well with decomposed granite. Of the recent 175 cuts performed, 70 are in the CRA/LA Mid-City Corridors project area (along Washington), and the majority of the others are in the Wilshire Center / Koreatown project area.

KYCC has not, in recent years, had to apply for a permit to have a tree removed (qualification “J”) but is aware of the process.

KYCC has restored urban habitat (qualification “K”) several times, most recently in May 2008, at Pio Pico Span School, in which exotics were removed, irrigation was worked on, new ground cover plants were installed, large areas were mulched, and 28 trees were planted.

KYCC has assisted in the creation of community gardens (qualification “L”) but it is not a focus of the agency because very little funding has been available for this. KYCC has the skills, know-how, and desire to do so, but has not found a reliable funding stream to spearhead the creation. We have assisted with garden bed creation and other relevant tasks.

KYCC has not in recent time, but is aware how to obtain permits for canopy and root pruning (qualification “M”). KYCC does not currently provide this service, but Irma Garcia, KYCC’s Certified Arborist, is able to obtain the permits and supervise landscape contracts to oversee the work – to ensure it is to UFD specification (qualification “N”)

In 2003, KYCC was subcontracted by the Los Angeles Conservation Corps to plant 500 trees along school routes to ten Los Angeles elementary schools.

Demonstrating our commitment to local communities and overall tree survivorship, KYCC obtained individual "Permission to Plant" forms from property owners. The benefits of this method were two-fold. It ensured that the trees were wanted and taken care of, and secondly, it almost completely eliminated the need to return to a site to remove an unwanted tree or to replace trees that died due to lack of care.

A short list of KYCC's responsibilities included:

- Surveying and marking possible tree planting locations
- Performing canvassing and outreach to the neighborhoods to obtain "Permission to Plant" forms
- Communicating with the Urban Forestry Division to obtain permits
- Communicating with nurseries to ensure quality product and proper tagging of trees
- Storage and maintenance of trees and supplies
- Calling Dig-Alert at least two days before each planting
- Transportation of trees, supplies, and our labor force to the planting site.
- Providing responsible training for the at-risk youth labor force used during the tree installation process

At the planting site KYCC performed:

- Traffic control
- Crew safety measures
- Direct oversight to ensure responsible planting practices and quality control from our Tree Planting Specialist and Crew Chief
- Site breakdown and clean up.

At the KYCC Environmental Services Unit, KYCC:

- Created and maintained a database of all work performed
- Received calls from residents
- Carefully maintained tree stock/storage
- Provided instant communication with the field crew(s)
- Was in daily contact with EAD staff

Together KYCC and LACC completed the Cool Communities Streetscape Project in 2002. This project involved the planting of approximately 2,000 trees along heavily used transportation corridors to large parks throughout the City of Los Angeles. KYCC planted an allotment of 900 trees in less than 1 year.

All of the responsibilities of the Planting Healthy School Routes project (listed above) were performed for the Cool Communities Streetscape Project.

In 2004-05, KYCC was allotted trees to plant (in conjunction with EAD) in increments ranging from approximately 100 to 300. In efforts to ensure efficient and professional plantings at all times, KYCC prioritized planting schedules immediately after receiving tree sites.

KYCC assisted EAD in receiving "Permission to Plant" forms from neighbors we encountered while planting on streets. Irma Garcia worked closely with Amy Schulenberg after each planting was complete. Reports were submitted within a timely manner and tree inspections reflected the successful plantings by KYCC.

All of the responsibilities of the Planting Healthy School Routes project (listed above) were also performed for the these two projects.

From its inception (January 2002) through its phase-out (2006), KYCC was a major partner of the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power's "Trees for a Green Los Angeles"

Workshop Program. KYCC provided workshop presenters to teach approximately 200 “Trees for a Green Los Angeles” slideshow (PowerPoint) presentations to City of Los Angeles residents. Topics covered in the 2-hour slideshow include:

- Proper tree selection
- Proper tree sitting
- Optimal planting methods
- Correct water techniques
- Pruning tips

D. Personnel

Dore Burry, KYCC’s Environmental Services Manager, performs contract management and oversees the day to day operations of the Environmental Services Unit. Dore has a strong background in ecology and conservation, and an Environmental Analysis and Design degree from the University of California, Irvine. He has worked on numerous CBO projects and is focused on keeping KYCC a leading CBO in the environmental services field. Dore will serve as the Program Manager for all projects that KYCC’s Environmental Services Unit involves itself. Hired in 2002, Dore, Irma Garcia, and Jerry Velasquez (information below) have overseen over 6,000 street trees plantings.

Irma Garcia, KYCC’s Tree Planting Program Coordinator and Certified Arborist, supervises all tree planting activities. Irma graduated with honors from the University of California, Irvine with an Environmental Analysis and Design degree. For two years at UCI, Irma volunteered on various coastal sage scrub restoration ecology projects. Before KYCC, Irma worked for Friends of the Los Angeles River as the Office Manager and has/will lead tours of the river several times in 2003. Her hard work ethic at KYCC in supervising crews has helped expand KYCC’s role in urban forestry projects. A student of arboriculture and landscape design at Pierce College, Irma hopes to continue to expand KYCC’s tree planting projects and urban greening projects in general.

Jerry Velasquez, KYCC’s Tree Planting Crew Chief, oversees the field activities of the tree planting crew. Jerry was hired as an at-risk youth directly from LACC. Jerry has proven himself capable of supervising crews of employees, at-risk youth, and volunteers efficiently and responsibly. He will assist in all aspects of the project. Between Jerry’s experience at LACC and KYCC, he has overseen and/or physically planted over 10,000 street trees across Los Angeles.

Other KYCC staff:

Tommy Rendon, Jose Pantoja, and Brenda Ramos are integral staff members of KYCC’s tree planting projects. Tommy and Jose are tree planting and outreach specialists. Both were part of KYCC’s reforestation of Koreatown after the 1992 riots and have performed community outreach and education for more than a decade for various KYCC urban environmental projects. Brenda Ramos is KYCC’s data entry office support and has been with KYCC since 2004.

At-Risk Youth Urban Environmental Youth Stewards:

KYCC has recently hired 1 at-risk youth and will be hiring 2 more in August 2008. They will be trained by our staff to perform watering, re-staking, re-tying, and community outreach and education (both pre-planting and post-planting).

External sources

KYCC is also fortunate to have close relationships with many City and other non-profit entities that could provide any expertise and advice if a need should arise. These relationships include the City of Los Angeles, Urban Forestry Division, Department of Recreation and Parks, Environmental Affairs Department, Department of Water and Power, Councilmember offices, Neighborhood Councils, and many other key departments that often provide expertise and advice.

E. Hourly Rates

Due to the huge variety and scope of tasks associated with this RFQ, providing an hourly rate schedule for services (by task) relating to the potential work is not possible without a more defined scope of work.

KYCC staff is compensated, at the minimum, several dollars an hour above the minimum living wage ordinance and full benefits (paid 100% by KYCC) are issued to all full-time, permanent staff. However, KYCC's close connection to the constituency of central and south Los Angeles allows KYCC to perform work with extremely competitive rates.

In most basic terms, for complete tree maintenance services, KYCC offers \$6 per tree, per month for 1 visit and \$10 per tree per month for 2 visits. The services included with such work includes:

- To visit each newly installed street tree to water, once or twice a month (depending on CRA/LA desires).
- To "re-stake" and "re-tie" the trees that are in need of adjustments.
- To rebuild the berms.
- To produce a monthly report listing the date visited, indicating work performed on each tree, and the health status of each tree visited.
- To perform other data collection, including identifying future opportunities for plantings.

KYCC has been contracted by several Neighborhood Councils and Neighborhood Associations to perform the above maintenance services. References can be furnished upon request. Additionally, KYCC is currently providing the above maintenance to the CRA/LA in the Wilshire Center / Koreatown and Pico Union 1 and 2 project areas for June through August on all newly planted trees to ensure they are cared for during the intense summer dry season. However, KYCC recommends that all newly planted trees are maintained in a format described above for at least 1 year.

All other potential work will need to be discussed formally and cost proposals will be developed on a per task basis.
